


#### **DCPS Graduation Rates**


#### Youth Arrests (2015-2019)

<sup>\*</sup>data is through Sept 2019








#### KHA – Reaching Farther


KHA-funded programs not shown on the map:

KHA is tasked with serving "at-hope" children and youth. But who is "at-hope" in our community? One way to qualify for free or reduced lunch rates at DCPS is for the family to fall below 185% of the poverty line, deemed "economically disadvantaged."



Note – We don't know how many children and youth are being served by others in the community. We will discuss shortly how to attain the more comprehensive data required to fully understand the need in Duval.




An MOU has been executed with the DJJ and data is readily being shared.




